
Bill Fifer's Hitty Pattern


These pattern pieces can be copied and cut out to paste onto rectangular blocks of wood for carving a Hitty. Basswood is a good wood to use. Prior to carving, drill all holes, including the 1/8" diameter holes up into the bottom of the legs for attaching the shoes. The holes for the arms and legs are drilled with a 3/16" drill bit.


Cut wooden blocks to the following sizes:

Head/Torso: 1¹/₂" square by 4¹/₄" long Legs: ³/₄" square by 3" long Arms: ⁵/₈" square by 3" long Shoes: ³/₈" wide by .26" tall by 3" long



Shoes: drill the 1/8" holes a bit in from each end of the 3" long block, then cut each end to length. Use a piece of a 1/8" dowel to hold the short shoe piece while shaping – most easily done on a rotating sanding disk.





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
